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#### ✚ **British Academy Small Research Grant Scheme**

**The British Academy has issued a call for a further round of Small Research Grants for awards to be taken up from 1 April 2012.**

Grants are available to support primary research in the humanities and social sciences. Applications will not be considered for less than £500. The maximum grant is £10,000 over two years. Applications for collaborative or individual projects are equally welcome under this scheme. Applications from international groups of scholars are welcome, provided there is a UK-based scholar as lead applicant. Funds are available to facilitate initial project planning and development; to support the direct costs of research; and to enable the advancement of research through workshops or conferences, or visits by or to partner scholars. Applicants may seek support for any combination of eligible activity and cost up to the overall limit of £10,000. The Academy will assess applications equally on their merits, with no preference as to mode of enquiry.

Grants are not intended to support interchange between UK and overseas scholars where there is no planned programme of activity to meet a clearly specified research objective (dissemination of results of research conducted under the aegis of the project for which funding is sought is a permitted purpose, but applications purely to organise an international conference, whether held in the UK or overseas will not be considered); nor are grants intended solely to support attendance at open conferences organised by a third party or international organisation. (In other words, this scheme does not cover applications that might previously have been made to the British Academy's Conference Support Grant or Overseas Conference Grant schemes, unless there is a direct connection to the dissemination of results of research funded under this proposal.)

**All applications** should demonstrate that Academy funds are sought for a clearly defined, discrete piece of research, which will have an identifiable outcome on completion of the Academy-funded component of the project.

### **Eligibility**

Grants are available to postdoctoral scholars who are ordinarily resident in the United Kingdom.

### **Closing Date**

Applications must be submitted via <https://egap.britac.ac.uk/>, the Academy's electronic grant application system, and the closing date for applications is **9 November 2011**.

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## **REF Preparations UPDATE**

Both Professor Paul Lister (DVC, Research and Enterprise) and Professor George Ellison (Director, Research and Graduate School [RGS]) left the university over the summer. They were instrumental in the planning and execution of the university's preparation for the REF 2014. These responsibilities are now, presumably, under the direction of DVC Peter McCaffery. The RGS has been dramatically downsized and reorganised in recent weeks. It is expected that faculties will take an increasing role in preparing for the REF

Time is now getting on and it is clearly necessary for the university – and consequently faculties – to proceed apace with concrete preparations for the REF. Below I summarise HEFCE requirements in this regard, followed by what the university is doing to prepare for the REF.

### **HEFCE requirements**

As of July 2011, HEFCE requires that each submission will contain the following information:

- Information on **staff in post** on the census date, 31 October 2013, selected by the institution to be included in the submission.
- Details of publications and other forms of **assessable output** that selected staff have produced during the publication period (1 January 2008 to 31 December 2013).
- A completed template describing the **submitted unit's approach to enabling impact from its research** during the assessment period (1 January 2008 to 31 July 2013), and **case studies describing specific examples of impacts** achieved during the assessment period, underpinned by excellent research in the period 1 January 1993 to 31 December 2013.
- Data about **research doctoral degrees awarded and research income** related to the period 1 August 2008 to 31 July 2013.

- A completed template describing the **research environment**, related to the period 1 January 2008 to 31 July 2013.

## **Timetable**

The timetable for the REF submission divides the process into four stages:

- Preparatory work
- Strategic Planning
- Mock Submission
- Final Submission

There is some overlap in the timing of the first two stages.

The notes below refer to actions by HEFCE (*in italics*) and include a number of critical deadlines set by HEFCE (dates **in bold**).

Timetabled actions by the University have an end date, and, where known, someone/team/structure responsible for each action identified. However, it is envisaged that responsibilities for some actions will be assigned during the development of the REF submission.

Where ‘SIT’ is referred to this reflects the historic configuration of the Research and Graduate School, of which the Strategic Intelligence Team was an integrated part. SIT is referred to throughout in the absence of confirmation of the team’s eventual location.

## **Preparatory Work**

### *Summary*

Building on already completed preparatory work for the REF, the aim is to establish mechanisms, procedures and guidance to support the conduct of a REF submission of whatever size. Although by its nature much of this work will be completed in the early months of the REF process, it is anticipated that some activities under this heading will need to wait for the outcome of both the REF strategic planning process and the University’s Research and Postgraduate Review.

The preparation stage includes the completion of a small number of example impact studies from each UoA. The evaluation of this task is intended to provide an early indication of potential difficulties in meeting this REF requirement in some or all UoAs. The development of guidance for completing the impact case studies and statement as set out in this timetable may need to be amended in the light of this evaluation exercise.

This stage of the REF process will be conducted alongside the development of the University’s institutional repository (IR) to ensure an economy of effort by requesting Faculties to provide research output information once only. When operational, the IR will hold details of the research outputs that will be included in the REF.

### *Deliverable:*

- A portal for the recording of research output details
- The collection and loading on the IR of research outputs since 2008 initially via the portal
- and subsequently directly on to the IR

- Completion and evaluation of impact case study examples, the development of further
  - guidance, and the development and delivery of impact workshops
  - An equalities policy document
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## **University Review of Postgraduate Education and Research, September-December 2011 UPDATE**

The Review is now well underway. Three meetings of the Review Project Board have been held to date (7 October, 2011). Fortnightly meetings are scheduled for the duration of the Review (until January 2012). The six workstreams are now up and running, meeting regularly to discuss key issues and prepare interim reports for the end of November. Jeff Haynes is leading the Enterprise workstream and is a member of the 'REF, research excellence and impact' workstream, led by Professor Mary Hickman, Director of the Cities Research Institute.

The Workstream on 'REF, research excellence and impact' is holding open meetings in each faculty in order to hear views across the University about these issues. The reason is that many people will not have been able to make a submission to the PG and Research Review by 23 September and therefore we are hoping colleagues will be able to come to these meetings specifically to discuss the work of Workstream 5. Prof. Mary Hickman, the workstream manager, will be attending all the meetings.

Workstream 5 – along with all other workstreams – will issue an interim report at the end of November 2011 and comments made and issues raised at the meetings will help guide us as we prepare. We very much welcome written submissions at this time and also hope that the interim report will elicit substantial feedback.

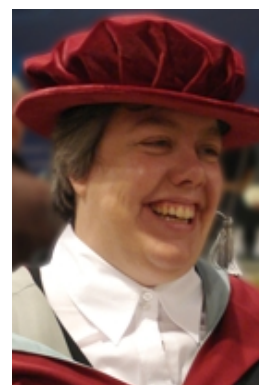

### **Professor Marilyn Freeman**

I ran a Relocation workshop with Dr. Nicola Taylor, University of Otago, New Zealand, at the AFCC 48<sup>th</sup> Annual Conference, Florida, June 2011, "Research, Policy and Practice in Family Courts" which was attended by researchers from all over the world, and where we presented the findings from our respective relocation research projects.

The Centre for Family Law and Practice held its first 2-week Summer School which was a multi-disciplinary international event (the participants were researchers, academics and practitioners from USA, Norway, South Africa, Ireland, Sweden, New Zealand, The Netherlands, and the UK) where we considered the issues involved in Children and the Law from a theoretical and practical perspective.

I will also be running a workshop on child abduction at the conference of the University of Western Cape in South Africa in March 2013 where I will present the interim findings of my research on the long-term effects of abduction.

I will also be attending the Sixth Special Commission on the 1980 Hague Child Abduction Convention to be held in January 2012 in the Hague to participate in the discussions concerning abduction and relocation.

I have been asked to be a peer reviewer of a scholarly article for a renowned peer reviewed law journal.

I have been invited to deliver a paper on the Forced Marriage research in which I am involved at the University of Ankara's conference on Domestic Violence in April 2013.

I have been invited to attend a meeting of experts of the Children's Rights section of the EU in Vienna October 2011.

I will be attending meetings with academics and researchers at the University of Barcelona in December to explore the possibility of collaborative activities.

I am currently undertaking the empirical interviews for my research into the long-term effects of child abduction.
