<b>STAGE 1</b>		
<b>Stage 1 Module 1</b>	A complete beginner with little or no previous experience of the language.	Can complete predictable tasks in the present tense, deal with basic social scenarios and interact with people in predictable situations.
<b>Stage 1 Module 2</b>	For 'false beginners'. You may have had some exposure to the language i.e. a few years at school, but not sat or failed a formal qualification.  Can get by in simple everyday situations.	Has basic understanding of present, past and future tense. Can deal with basic social scenarios. Understands the gist of conversations in predictable situations e.g. at the restaurant.
<b>STAGE 2</b>		
<b>Stage 2 Module 1</b>	Post-GCSE (or equivalent).  Can deal with everyday situations with reasonable confidence, e.g. making travel arrangements or finding your way around.	Can deal with routine daily activities and exchange oral and written information on predictable topics. Can confidently describe professional roles and responsibilities in a basic way.
<b>Stage 2 Module 2</b>	Pre-A level standard. You will be able to use the language in a wide range of situations.	Can exchange oral and written information on familiar topics. Can give opinions about topics such as politics, company culture, family matters. Can read and write confidently about various topics.
<b>STAGE 3</b>		
<b>Stage 3 Module 1</b>	Post AS/A level standard (or equivalent). You will be able to communicate well in the language.	Can deal with various work-related and leisure tasks. Oral proficiency is good and clear and conversations about unpredictable topics can be understood. Can give and understand advice on professional matters.
<b>Stage 3 Module 2</b>	Good A level standard (or equivalent). You may also have spent time in a country where the language is spoken.	Can confidently write letters and documentation to native speakers. Can deal effectively with work-related and leisure tasks, making appropriate use of the language according to the professional or social context.
<b>STAGE 4</b>		
<b>Stage 4</b>	A level, plus 1 year of study. At this	Can interact with native speakers in

<b>Module 1</b>	level you will translate short texts into English and the target language. You will have a good working knowledge of the language structures.	a professional context. Speech is nearly fluent in social situations and understanding is good. Can understand and participate confidently in social and professional situations.
<b>Stage 4 Module 2</b>	A level, plus 1-2 years of study. The focus of these classes is topic based. You will also translate texts both ways.	Can fully interact with people in a professional context, exchanging information on all matters related to occupation. Can negotiate with people and discuss complex ideas.
<b>STAGE 5</b>		
<b>Stage 5 Module 1</b>	Designed for students with language skills at higher advanced level. Students returning from an extended period of study abroad will normally take this level.	Can deal with complex and varied tasks at social and professional level. Vocabulary is varied and precise, speech is near fluent and most complex situations are understood.
<b>Stage 5 Module 2</b>	The highest OLP level and the qualifying module for the award of our language degrees. Virtually native-speaker standard	Competent enough to deal with all tasks at professional level, including for specialised purposes. Can interpret or translate information confidently and accurately in social and professional contexts
